Foreword

ISO (the International Organization for Standardization) is a worldwide federation of national standards bodies (ISO member bodies). This fourth edition cancels and replaces the third edition (ISO 1754:1986), of which it constitutes a technical revision. It includes picture sizes transferred from clause 3 of ISO 1203:1984.

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1 Scope

This International Standard specifies the image dimensions (on the film) of still pictures made with cameras in which the image dimensions are defined by the camera frame.

This International Standard does not apply to stereo photography cameras (see ISO 515).

Panoramic image dimensions (13×36) of cameras featuring a mid-roll panoramic photo are not specified in this International Standard.

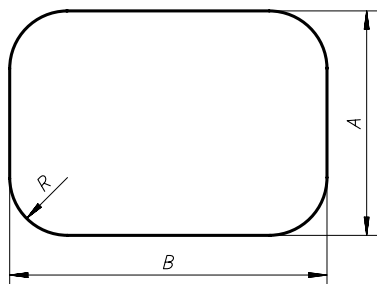


Figure 1 — Picture sizes

The dimensions shown in figure 1 are given in table 1.
